#### RESPONDING IN CRUCIAL MOMENTS

The Commons Librarians monitor trends and needs in social movements. At times of crisis and opportunity the librarians gather and distribute relevant materials to assist campaigners and community builders to seize the moment.

Trans people are under attack.

Around the world right wing forces are scapegoating trans and gender diverse people. They are shutting down community events, restricting access to gender affirming care, and changing laws.

Jackie Turner researched the anti-trans movements in the UK and USA to alert Australians to the risks. Jackie approached the Commons Library to publish the 'The Anti-Trans Movement Framework'.

In the week after the framework was published an anti-trans rally was held in Melbourne and attended by neo-Nazis. People were shocked and distressed but the framework helped them understand the connections. It was shared online 123 times and viewed on the website 1,888 times (and counting).

There has been a surge in community support for the trans community with strong attendance at counter rallies.

The Commons is proud to provide a platform to campaigners like Jackie.
