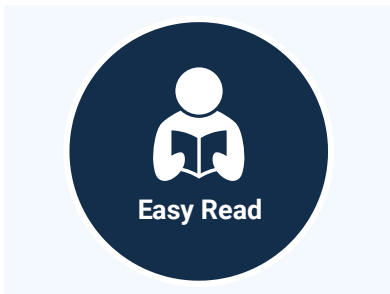

A protest is when people meet together in one place to call for social change.



Social change is when change happens that affects many people.

A positive social change makes things better for people.

For example, a law may be changed to stop discrimination.



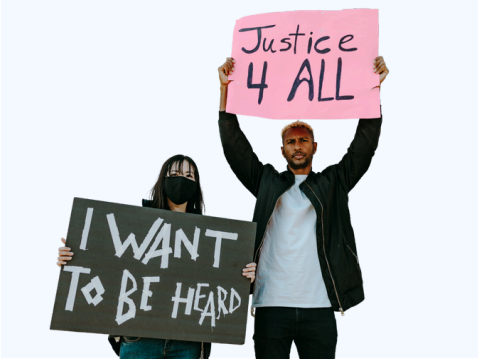
There are many ways you can share messages at a protest.

Some ways to share messages



Write or paint a message on cardboard.



Print a message on paper and glue it onto cardboard.

You can add a stick and make it into a sign.



Hold up a sign that is given out by the campaigners.



Paint a message on material to make a banner.

Some ways to share messages



Wear a badge with a message on it.



Wear a t-shirt with a message on it.



Write or paint a message on an umbrella.



Wear or carry something that is connected to your message.

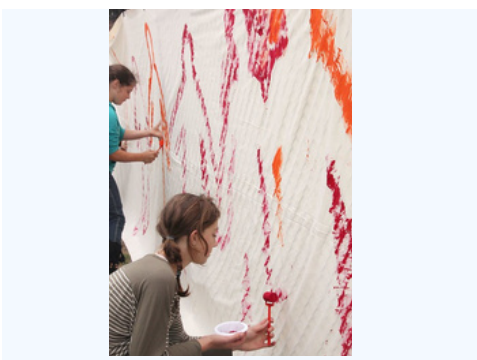
